Summertime with God

"I got a blank space baby, and I'll write your name." -Taylor Swift, "Blank Space"

Like other songs, this one got stuck in my head two summers ago when it was on heavy rotation in the gym. Bubblegum pop can be good for background, but it typically doesn't stand up to scrutiny. But I've grown to love the song, and Ryan Adams' version of it even more so, mostly because it reminds me of loves that we have during summers.

Think of other summertime jams that inspired love -- "Summer Nights" from Grease, "My Sharona" by the Knack, or even "Vacation" by the Go-Gos (although that was more of a breakup song). They may recall a face, or a name, but more likely a feeling of excitement and exuberance, of daring and stealing something that is hidden away.

In the book of the prophet Jeremiah, the young man laments to God about the work of the prophet. He's abused, and in prison, and he fears for his life. He cries out to God that he didn't want this, but God wooed him, seduced him even, to speak truth to power, no matter the cost. Jeremiah, and some of the other minor prophets, tell us that our relationship with God is like one of lovers. How can God be like a lover?

Without getting too specific, ask yourself how God has called to you in love. For some of us, it's a love that might have started with a nudge, a wink, a note passed in class. 'God tapped me on the shoulder, and I decided I wanted to learn more.' So you start spending time together, you begin to trust each other more and more, and you learn about each other.

Perhaps there are times when the affair cools, or erupts in anger. Sometimes other lovers will come and go and draw us away. I have found that those other lovers never last for long. They may look good, smell good, and make us feel good for a moment, but they do not last. They do not comfort us when we are not our best, they do not forgive us when we hurt them, nor do they call us to be our best selves. Only God does this.

So consider a summertime fling with God. Yeah, I just suggested that. How can we do that? Well, start by talking and listening. Start by spending time with God where you are. Then make a date. Make a date to spend an hour on Sunday in church. Show God you want to be faithful. Tell the other gods to take the summer off, you're with bae now. God wants to write the name of the One who will always love you on your blank space.

Vestry Notes

Long-Term Planning for SMC

Last summer, our Rector and Senior Warden gathered a group of parishioners and asked that they provide advice and support to our Vestry for the decision-making in 2018 and 2019. Parishioners serving on the this committee (LTPC) were Bud Billups, Ann Lallande, George Saroch, Tiffany Davenport, Brian Williams, Teresa Todd, Ernie Tucker, Jeff Macris, Fran Becker, Anne Sessions and Peter Mayer. For many months the LTPC interviewed parishioners and staff through focus groups, surveys and one-on-one meetings. They discerned four primary areas to focus future planning: our church mission of transforming lives in Christ, our structures and beautiful campus, our worship and formation, and, arching over all these areas, the church's future sustainability.



At our annual meeting in January, there was a brief presentation on the LTPC work towards making St. Margaret's a "Better Church" through our commitments to our Day School, community, Endowed Grant's Program and most importantly to you, our parishioners. Subsequent to the annual meeting, the LTPC presented the Vestry with their recommended priorities and at the Vestry's annual retreat in March, the following priorities were approved.

- Authorize a <u>new study of existing campus</u> that considers future growth; our mission statement; the discernment on the future of campus property (e.g. parking, church buildings, rental house, cemetery, outdoor space, Day School); commissions/program use of buildings; and increased sanctuary seating options. Vestry members Maggy Cullman, Tom Wenz, Nellie Bowers, Al Todd and parishioners Bud Billups, Teresa Todd and Phil Graham are meeting to develop specific strategies for this priority.
- ¬ Set <u>fiscal priorities</u> and <u>benchmarks</u>, including: endowment management; maintenance fund; budget priorities (e.g. mission, formation, compensation); building debt; shared expenses with St. Margaret's Day School; income use of buildings, to give us a map to where we think our budget/giving/ percentages should be in 2018 and 2019. Our Vestry, clergy, staff and parishioners, including Peter Mayer, Doug Seybert, Tim Parker, Julia Drooff, Anne Sessions, Charlie Lang, Elizabeth Radley, and George Saroch are having serious discussions to set these priorities and benchmarks.
- Develop <u>stronger lay leadership</u> that enhances <u>the spiritual growth of parishioners</u> (including families in crisis and seniors) through enhanced communications, education and scripture-based references about our <u>commissions' awareness and impacts</u>. Helping with this priority are Vestry members Trish Schilling, Ruth McVey Harmon, Fran Becker, Valery Weekley, Christine Feldmann, Al Todd, Paul O'Donnell, Gwen Davis.

Mark Your Calendar for our 325th Anniversary Celebration Weekend: October 20-22, 2017

The weekend of **October 20 through the 22** we will be celebrating St. Margaret's 325th Anniversary and our history on the Broade Necke Peninsula.

Some context: 325 years ago the real greatest witch-hunt launched in Salem. And the desert libraries of Timbuktu, Mali, were the repositories of some of the greatest ideas on the planet. No overdue fines, very helpful librarians. British colonies had no combustion engines, no indoor plumbing, no penicillin. No human rights, no deodorant, no Old Bay. There were lively horse races, abundant flying squirrels, and the first writ of habeas corpus as of 1679.

Retelling: The History and Archives Committee, which has been recovering, restoring, and preserving records and artifacts of St. Margaret's history for years now will be able show you, over the coming months, how a congregation built through the sweat of farm families, enslaved workers, and some traveling ecclesiastical support has survived, served, and thrived.

Teaching: They will show us context, conflict, struggle, celebration, tradition and growth, within the microcosm that is our Parish. There are tales of snakes in the organ, bats in the belfry, body snatching, and jousting. I think that just covers the first 200 years. Make room for wars and victories, depression and recovery, knights and bishops.

Heroes: On this occasion we will also be looking forward – asking, "What have we learned? Who have we touched? Where can we continue to serve?" This is the genesis of **Project 3.25**. The Missions Commission is focusing St. Margaret's missions, and outreach efforts, on an area that is within 3.25 miles of our front door. That radius touches water, farms, innumerable schools, communities of diversity, wealth and poverty. It brings us into contact with other faith communities, other rooms in our Father's house. It challenges us to strengthen and deepen our roots, to share, and serve our neighbors.

As to the **goats**, I'm sure there have been goats at some time or another grazing on St. Margaret's grounds. And if not, I'm going to hear about it.

Project 3.25 will send us forth into the next 325 years. History is the foundation that anchors us, and service is how we reach deep into our community to keep faith strong.

Music Notes

It is with sadness that I announce the Music at St. Margaret's Concert Series has reached the end of its eleven year run and will be suspended going forward. Attendance at the recitals has fallen in recent years and combined with increased costs, even with a generous grant, this year's season was not able to break even. The concert series has always been self-sustaining and to avoid being a burden on St. Margaret's budget, it must be ended.



When I first came to St. Margaret's in 2004, I was told that there was \$1,500.00 in a concert series fund account. That money had been raised at a benefit concert given by the late Judith Werle Meeder accompanied by Louise Carlson and a string quartet put together by Judith's daughter, Laurie. I immediately proposed establishing a concert series as a way to accomplish the following:

- Raising the expectation of quality musical performance in the church.
- · Bringing under performed music to a listening audience.
- Enhancing the reputation of St. Margaret's as a music center in the community.
- · Providing opportunity to local musicians.
- · Providing a place where families could bring children to learn about music at low to no cost.
- · Providing refreshment of the soul and ordering of the mind through an aesthetic experience.

At the time, the Reverend Wm. Mark Wastler, suggested waiting until there was significant support for the series before beginning it. Additionally, the piano available for accompaniment in the church was substandard and needed replacement. A Gala Fund Raising concert called "I Love a Piano" was given in 2005 and a 7 foot conservatory Yamaha grand was brought in for the occasion. The line-up for the concert was impressive, including Broadway star Mary Stout. The church was sold out and by the end of the evening, all the funds necessary to purchase the piano were in hand, so the instrument never had to leave St. Margaret's again.

Planning for a concert series began in earnest and in May 2006, a test concert was given featuring James Woolwine on piano and guitar. Mr. Woolwine had recently graduated from the Berklee College of Music in Boston, MA. He is the son of Ms. Myrna Bein, a long time parishioner at St. Margaret's. The turnout for Mr. Woolwine's appearance was significant and indicated that the parish was ready for a full concert series.

The next fall we began the series and over the ensuing years have brought name talent from the International and National stages, as well as fine local talent, including Grammy Award nominees and winners, stars from Broadway and Opera, and international jazz artists.

At first the concert series operated on a free will donation basis, but with the economic downturn of the Great Recession, proceeds began dropping off and the series became a subscription series with set prices. Subsequently the series began relying on generous donations as much as ticket sales.

While the formal series may be at its end, we will continue to have some musical events at the church like Vespers and Evensongs provided by our choirs. Individual artists who wish may use the church for recitals, as will happen this late summer when jazz guitarist Tony Romano will do a CD launch recital.

And if anyone would like to sponsor a recital or concert, please see me. We love having concerts here, where our beautiful church and its excellent acoustics delight all listeners.


Todd Marcus, Jazz Clarinet in concert on Saturday, June 17, 7:30 p.m.

Bringing Shelter to the Underserved

Since 1992, a growing number of Anne Arundel County churches and synagogues have cooperatively provided shelter for the homeless as part of the Winter Relief Program administered by the Arundel House of Hope. St. Margaret's has participated in this coalition of 70 churches and synagogues for the past four years, with as many as 140 parishioners involved each year. Several of our homeless guests have found shelter, employment, and a renewed sense of hope and self-esteem through the efforts of so many of our parishioners.



This 70-church coalition has now extended its partnership in a more substantive way to help individuals and families obtain more permanent housing solutions. The coalition has established a program through the Community Foundation of Anne Arundel County to provide security deposit grants for individuals vetted and qualified by housing authorities to seek permanent housing in public or privately available housing facilities. Stable housing is consistent with the widely accepted principle of social service organizations that the key to long term personal stability is "housing first". For many, it will be the first time in their lives they have had the opportunity to occupy a space of their own, a fact barely conceivable to most of our congregation.

Through this program, participating churches will partner with county agencies and non-profits who use professional case workers to qualify and mentor Anne Arundel County residents seeking to obtain affordable housing. Both the currently homeless, as well as those living often in less than desirable housing conditions, will be eligible. By joining forces with other churches, SMC will be able to leverage its resources to bring real change to people's lives.

SMC has been asked to participate in this ministry of shelter by donating \$500 this calendar year to help reach the \$10,000 minimum necessary at the Community Foundation to begin making grants. Each church is then asked to contribute \$1,000 annually thereafter to sustain the program. Even if only half the 70 churches involved are able to commit to that nominal level of annual funding, we will be in a position to help many individuals and families achieve their dream of independent living in a home of their own making.

A Governing Board comprised of the Arundel House of Hope and representatives selected from participating faith communities will determine the grant allocations to be made from the fund. We have undertaken several coordinating meetings with the housing agencies to prepare for the challenges of dealing with chronically underserved individuals, including many with multiple personal, emotional, and legal problems, to ensure that the program, while compassionate in nature, is also undertaken objectively with success and results in mind. Those of us who have worked with the Winter Relief Program and social service agencies over the years have seen an increasing number of individuals and families who desire, and need stable shelter to improve their lives, but have little or no cash reserves. This program is a compassionate, transparent, and focused effort to help these citizens, our neighbors, as they struggle to stabilize and improve their lives.

Be a Bay-Wise Homeowner

Composting has multiple benefits: for your garden, for the environment and for your commitment to stewardship of God's creation. Creating compost from your yard and kitchen waste returns beneficial organic nutrients to the soil, cuts down on landfill and gives you a great sense of satisfaction.



To get started:

- Choose your method- open piles, built frame or purchased bin. All work on the same principle. Suit your personal preference.
- Gather leaves, grass clippings, shredded paper and vegetable based food scraps. Don't ever add meat, pet droppings, pesticides or herbicide treated materials.
- Be careful with including weeds. Your compost pile must be very hot, not just warm, to kill the seeds. If in doubt, err on the side of caution. Discard questionable materials in your regular curbside trash pick up.
- Turn your pile as often as possible, the more the faster the process works.
- Add some moisture each time you add a new layer.
- Give your compost a chance to work. Add compost to your garden every few weeks before planting. Mix it in and let it sit before you plant.
- Too much? Divide and conquer. Start a new pile and take from the original while the new material decomposes.
- Don't worry about bugs. Most are ok. You want worms. They speed up the decomposition process. Leave them in the compost when you move it to your garden. Your plants will benefit from the improved soil texture and aeration the worms provide.
- The compost process works best at temperatures between 120 and 150 degrees. If you are a beginner, warm summer months are easier to get things going properly. Start now.

Composting isn't really the work or inconvenience you might think. We keep a ceramic canister near the sink. All appropriate scraps get scrapped into it and every day or two it gets dumped into our secured plastic compost bin to keep wildlife from scrounging in it. Yard waste goes into it's own pile, turned occasionally and sprinkled with lime when we remember to do it. Both sources provide excellent compost for our flowers and vegetables, producing more than I have the time or knees to cultivate. Between composting and recycling, we have very little waste going into a landfill. By using our rain barrels to water the gardens as well, we feel that we are returning as much as we are given. And that is what stewardship is all about. Good luck. Get started.

Over the last two months of 2016, 13.8% of our energy in the new formation building came from the solar panels. From February through April, we're averaging 23.3% a month.
