Again, it will be different. My hope is that we will be able to gather again in January 2022 for our annual meeting that will be preceded by a parish-wide potluck. From my lips to God's ears. 

Ushering in a New Year

Despite continued pandemic related limitations and setbacks with technology, a wide variety of musical offerings and liturgies were offered virtually over the last six weeks, bringing 2020 to a close.

Beginning with the Thanksgiving Hymn Sing on November 22, co-hosted by yours truly and Sarah Westcott, parishioners and friends joined via Zoom to sing and learn a bit about their favorite hymns of harvest. We hope to make this a seasonal event of fellowship and learning and offer it in person and online.

The SMC Advent season unofficially began on December 6 with our annual service of Advent Lessons and Carols. The service included archival recordings of past services, new virtual recordings made by choir members at home, and lessons read by many of our lay ministry leaders. My thanks goes to the 2020 Stewardship team as stewardship season concluded for asking the Third Sunday Band to provide music for the December 12 holiday concert, which went from being a live event to a virtually recorded video with a special gift of music for the 12 Days of Christmas! We offered our Blue Christmas service December 16 and a special outdoor evening Compline service December 19, along with two virtually recorded services on Christmas Eve, one for families at 5:00 p.m. and a traditional one at 7:00 p.m. featuring members of the Annapolis Bay Strings and all of our favorite Christmas carols and musical selections.

Perhaps the highlight for me this year was the Berthelotte's rendition of Silent Night at the 5:00 p.m. service and the strings playing along to Elizabeth and Katherine Parker singing Silent Night at 7:00 p.m., on Katherine's birthday no less! As has been tradition at SMC, Christmas Lessons and Carols was offered on December 27, the first Sunday after Christmas. Similar to our Advent carol service, archival recordings, virtual recordings made by choir members at home, and lessons read by children of choir members were compiled into the final video. Special thanks to my friend Merideth Hite Estevez, oboe faculty at the University of Delaware, for providing music virtually for the carol "I wonder as I wander," sung by Alice Conover.

Prior to Thanksgiving, Rev. Peter brought up the idea of offering a special service to mark the end of the calendar year 2020. As Episcopalians, we have many a resource from which to draw inspired suggestions for special services called the Book of Occasional Services. In it includes an Evening Service for New Year's focused around the theme of light and full of options for lessons. In an effort to add another special element, colleagues Elissa Edwards, acclaimed early music soprano and music staff at the Washington National Cathedral, and her fiancé, Jeremy Sheeler, a professional videographer, helped bring our vision of a service ushering in the new year to life. A HUGE thank you to those who provided their voices as cantors for all of these services and our regular Advent Sunday services and the instrumentalists who offered their talents.

Looking ahead to the rest of the winter, there are still many questions, but I hope that we are permitted to regather, sing God's praises again and be able to worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness very soon! As different as this holiday season was, it is my hope that each of you felt the same measure of light and beauty I did and that it will carry into a safe, happy, healthy and wonderful 2021.

Grants Committee Work Underway

This year's Grants Committee is already hard at work. The members are reviewing dozens of grant proposals from as far away as Africa and as close as the Broadneck Peninsula.

After review of the applications, the committee will narrow the pool to a dozen or so finalists. These potential applicants will be visited (or Skyped) by grant liaisons, working in pairs during February. Organization representatives will then visit (or Skype) St. Margaret's for an interview with the entire committee in March. Final decisions will be made after all the interviews are complete. The Missions Commission and Vestry will approve the slate of recipients and the winners will be notified in April.

Each grant recipient organization will receive a post grant liaison from the church to help them over the next year. The intention is to strengthen the relationship between St. Margaret's and its grant recipients.

West Annapolis Pop Up Pantry Continues

Among this effort partners are a coalition of churches that include St. Margaret's, Downtown Hope, the Guadeloupe Ministries of St. Mary's, and the Evangelical Presbyterian Church of Annapolis. Donations pour in from local produce vendors for WAPP's food pantry. The inventory has grown beyond groceries to diapers, books, toys, games, art supplies and even furniture. **The Evangelical Presbyterian Church, on Bestgate Avenue is currently project headquarters for drop offs.** Donations are accepted for processing by a team of volunteers on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Living in a world that has dramatically altered our lives, we knew we could not be blind to the challenges and needs of our spiritual community. We wanted to give our fellow parishoners the knowledge that St. Margaret’s is here for them while also allowing space for those who needed to say “not me, not this year” or who needed to alter their pledge to a lesser amount.

What we didn’t push or expect were that there would also be those that understood the landscape and needs of our community and increased their 2021 commitment to a higher level. Through Zoom and church committee participation, we are finding ways to connect. Even in a worshipping-distanced environment, we are putting community into practice. And through support and understanding, we are putting compassion front and center.

The Annual Meeting is rapidly approaching and, while we had no hard deadline this year, we would like to present reasonable budget expectations to the Vestry. There are still a large number of previous pledgers who remain silent in this current campaign. If you are in that group, we kindly ask that you reach out to one of us to let us know if you are bypassing a pledge this year, still need more time or if you have a number in mind for 2021. The current numbers are truly amazing, and we are grateful to the 187 pledges we have received for a total of \$895,845.




VESTRY NOMINATIONS



Session 2021 Pre-Session Update for our Diocese

This year the Maryland General Assembly 2021 will look a little different. Opening day for the session is **January 13, 2021** and House and Senate chambers may be empty and quiet. Great efforts have been taken by both houses to create safe conditions during this pandemic.

An example of the many efforts to keep Marylanders safe, extensive cleaning and sanitizing of the buildings, virtual hearings, limits and on in-person meetings with legislators will take place. Covid19 testing for legislators during session, public demonstrations, meetings with leadership, a two-person visitor limit and legislative aides providing escorts to meetings represent some of the changes in Annapolis this year.

The Maryland Episcopal Public Policy Network (MEPPN) has already attended hearings this fall in the Senate that were concerned with police reform. The group has provided written testimony and are working with coalitions to advance pertinent legislation.

This year the MEPPN has a premier advocacy alert program that will provide Senate and House bill information, hearing dates and times to keep you informed and make sure your voice is understood. Stay tuned for additional updates as the session moves forward. A Virtual Episcopal Advocacy Day will be scheduled soon.
